(Note: Within each tier, there is an extra opportunity that the item will drop in "StatTrak" condition, a special function that tracks the number of eliminates made with that specific weapon.)

As the table clearly demonstrates, the chances of pulling a high-tier item (Red or Gold) are incredibly low. Statistically, the vast majority of case openings will result in a Blue-tier product worth significantly less than the £ 2.50 expense of the key.
