

Why spiders show up in Ottawa basements

If you are finding more **basement spiders** than you would like, the reason is usually less about your home being “dirty” and more about conditions that attract them. In Ottawa, long, cold winters and the spring thaw can push pests toward warmer indoor spaces, especially basements. That seasonal movement creates favourable conditions for spider activity, particularly in homes with older foundations and small structural openings.
