

Newton has a way of making visitors slow down. It is close to Boston, but the pace feels different once you get onto its village streets, past shaded sidewalks, commuter rail stops, and the older homes that give the city so much of its character. People often come for a specific errand, a school visit, or a trip into the city, then leave surprised by how much there is to notice in a single afternoon. The historic homes, independent shops, and cultural stops are worth the trip on their own.
