Coinflip	A simple 1v1 PvP video game where two gamers wager skins of roughly equal value. A virtual coin is turned, and the winner takes the entire pot. 50/50 odds, minus a small platform commission (rake).	
Prize	Numerous gamers contribute skins to a main pot. Each skin's value figures out the player's "ticket" share. A spinner selects one winner who takes everything. Based upon the overall value contributed; platform takes a percentage cost.
