For many years, Valve has likewise carried out trade lock limitations (forcing players to wait a week before trading a recently gotten skin) to curb rapid-fire wagering.

In spite of these steps, the industry continues to adjust. Numerous contemporary CS2 casinos use peer-to-peer (P2P) trading systems or cryptocurrency combinations to bypass conventional trade restrictions imposed by Steam, showing resistant in the face of developer crackdowns.
