3. **The Execution:** The game loads. When the gamer puts a bet, the aggregator manages the financial transaction loop-- subtracting funds from the gambling establishment's gamer wallet and crediting earnings back firmly.

This seamless interaction guarantees that players experience absolutely no latency, regardless of which studio produced the video game they are playing.
