- **Set strict financial limits:** Treat gambling simply as a kind of entertainment with a fixed budget, instead of a trustworthy method to make money.
- **Safeguard your Steam account:** Enable Steam Guard Two-Factor Authentication (2FA) and never log into your Steam account on unverified third-party domains.
