

If you're contending with bed bugs in **Hamilton, Ontario**, the good news is that you do have **non-toxic bed bug removal** options. Steam treatment is another strong choice for spot treatment. The key is **steam penetration**. Steam works best on surfaces that can handle moisture and where the nozzle can be applied directly to hiding spots.

Vacuuming helps eliminate live bugs, shed skins, and debris from visible areas. Use a crevice tool to reach seams, edges, and corners. Vacuuming alone will not solve the problem, but it can cut down the population quickly when paired with other methods. Empty the vacuum into a sealed bag right away and remove it from the home.

Mattress encasements are useful because they trap any bugs already inside the mattress and make the sleeping area easier to inspect. They also remove the many seams and folds where bed bugs can hide. If you use encasements, make sure they are made for bed bug control and kept sealed at all times.

Additional helpful steps include:

- Using **interceptor traps** under bed and furniture legs to track activity.
- Cutting down clutter so bugs have fewer places to hide.
- Keeping bedding isolated and off the floor.
- Targeting the **sleeping area** first, because that is where bed bugs feed most often.

These methods work best when they are part of a broader **sanitation protocol** and not treated as one-off fixes. The goal is to remove as many bugs as possible and then keep watch for anything that survives.

What should I do one room at a time to stop bed bugs spreading?

To prevent bed bugs from getting around, inspect each room with a focus on their usual hiding places. This is particularly important in Hamilton homes where shared hallways, older framing, and dense housing can help bugs travel rapidly.

First, start in the bedroom. Inspect the **bed frame**, mattress seams, box spring, and headboard. Bed bugs often hide in joints and fasteners, so take your time around **furniture joints**.
