What Makes a CS: GO Skin Rare?

4. **Discontinuation:** When Valve eliminates a case from active drop swimming pools or terminates a collection, the supply becomes finite, triggering rates to rise as demand persists.
5. **Stickers and Souvenirs:** Tournament souvenirs and weapons decorated with uncommon, discontinued sticker labels (like Katowice 2014 holo stickers) can multiply a skin's standard value tremendously.

The Holy Grails: Most Legendary Rare CS: GO Skins

Particular skins have actually transcended the video game to become digital folklore. Below are a few of the rarest and most expensive skins in CS: GO history.

1. AWP|Dragon Lore (Souvenir)

Undoubtedly the most well-known skin in the video game, the Dragon Lore features a legendary beast breathing fire throughout its body. While basic Factory New versions command enormous amounts, the **Souvenir Factory New Dragon Lore** from major competitions (particularly signed by gamers like Tyler "Skadoodle" Latham from Boston 2018) are ultra-rare.

- **Estimated Value:** £ 150,000+

2. StatTrak™ M4A4|Groan (Factory New)

The Howl is distinct because it is the just "Contraband" quality product in the game. Quickly after its release in 2014, Valve discovered that the artwork was plagiarized. Valve immediately got rid of the case, altered the artwork, and updated the existing M4 Howls to "Contraband" status, stopping any new drops forever.

- **Approximated Value:** £ 30,000 to £ 100,000+ (depending upon stickers and wear)

3. AK-47|Case Hardened (Pattern 661 - "The Blue Gem")

While the Case Hardened surface is common, specific pattern templates feature almost 100% solid blue on the leading publication and receiver. Pattern index 661 in Factory New condition is extensively thought about the supreme AK-47 skin.

- **Approximated Value:** Estimated to be worth upwards of £ 400,000 to £ 500,000 based upon recent personal collector offers.

4. Karambit|Case Hardened (Blue Gem - Pattern 387)

Similar to the AK-47, the Karambit Case Hardened with pattern index 387 includes an entirely blue playside. A pristine Factory New variation of this knife is held by a single collector who notoriously declined a EUR1.2 million offer.



- **Approximated Value:** Priceless/ Over £ 1,000,000
