

Rockville does not announce itself with a single signature landmark or a skyline you can spot from miles away. It reveals itself more gradually, through courthouse squares, neighborhood centers, ethnic grocery aisles, park trails, and the steady hum of a county seat that has learned how to grow without losing its civic memory. That balance is part of what makes Rockville worth paying attention to. It is not simply a suburb that happens to sit near Washington, D.C. It is a place with its own rhythm, one shaped by old settlement patterns, public institutions, immigrant communities, and a calendar full of events that can turn an ordinary weekend into a surprisingly good day out.
