As illustrated above, your home or the RNG (Random Number Generator) determines when a crash happens. A round can crash instantly at 1.00 x, ruining anybody who did not respond in milliseconds.

Why Do Players Risk Their Skins?

The skin economy operates in a different way than fiat currency. To numerous gamers, a digital knife worth £ 300 feels less tangible than a £ 300 bill in their physical wallet.
