

Jessup sits in an interesting pocket of central Maryland, close enough to Baltimore, Washington, and Columbia to feel connected to all three, yet distinct enough to have its own rhythm. Travelers often pass through on the way to somewhere else, which is a mistake if you care about places that reveal themselves slowly. Jessup does not market itself with the polished certainty of a postcard town. Its appeal is subtler.
