Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Significant wear; paint is noticeably cracked and dull in major areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Heavy wear. The weapon looks heavily weathered, rusted, or battered. (Note: Some skins look distinctively "cool" or "blacked-out" in high float BS).
