- **Terminal/Sudden Death Battles:** If a tie takes place, a tie-breaker round determines the winner.
- **Crazy/Reverse Mode:** In these trick modes, the player with the *least expensive* total value wins the pot, including an amusing layer of method where players actively root for bad luck.

Dangers and Considerations
