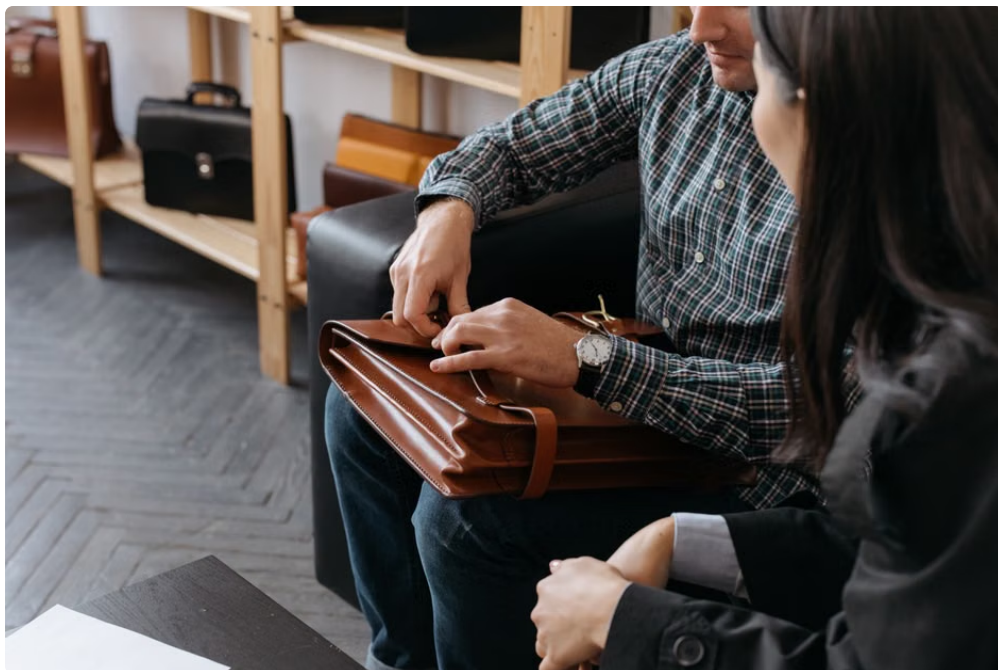


Briefcase vs. Messenger vs. Tote vs. Backpack: What Does Your Bag Say About You?

Construction Checks You Can Do in Hand Before Buying

1. **Zipper Test:** Always test the zippers twice. Glided zippers can snag or break under pressure, especially when carrying bulky extra shoes. If the zipper sticks at all, do not proceed!
2. **Handle Strength:** Check the handles by lifting and shaking the bag a bit. Bags with glued-only handles (no stitching reinforcement) are notorious for tearing. 3. **Inner Compartments:** Look for dedicated shoe compartments or at least a wide base compartment to isolate shoes from other belongings. This prevents damage and odor spreading.
