

Valley Park, Missouri, is one of those places that tends to reveal itself slowly. At first glance, it looks like a quiet suburban community tucked into the western edge of St. Louis County. Brick can collect dark biological growth in mortar lines and porous spots. Painted wood needs careful cleaning because aggressive pressure can lift paint or push water where it should not go. Even newer materials can look neglected if they are not washed on a reasonable schedule.

The climate also creates a false sense of cleanliness. A house may look fine from the curb, especially after a dry spell, but shaded sides often tell a different story. North-facing walls, fence lines, soffits, and the area around downspouts are where buildup hides first. By the time it is obvious from the street, the surface usually has been accumulating residue for months.
