market.

- **The Trade Hold Update:** To combat instantaneous skin transferral utilized by gambling bots, Valve introduced a 7-day trade hold on all recently traded items. While this decreased instantaneous automated gambling deposits, operators rapidly adjusted by utilizing peer-to-peer (P2P) market systems where bots help with trades directly in between users.
- **Account Bans:** Valve routinely bans accounts associated with industrial gambling operations, though the sheer volume of new accounts makes enforcement a continuous video game of whack-a-mole.
