- **The Low-Multiplier Auto-Cashout:** Players set an automatic cashout at a really low multiplier, such as 1.01 x to 1.10 x. While this yields regular, little wins, a single 1.00 x crash can clean out dozens of incremental victories.
- **The Martingale System:** A classic progressive wagering strategy where a gamer doubles their bet after every loss, attempting to recover all previous losses plus an earnings when they finally win. This needs a huge bankroll and typically hits table or site limitations during a losing streak.
- **The Anti-Martingale (Paroli) System:** Players double their bets after a *win* instead of a loss, trying to profit from winning streaks while minimizing damage throughout cold runs.
- **High-Risk Hunting:** Waiting for prolonged streaks of low crashes (e.g., a number of rounds under 1.50 x) and betting high on a viewed "high multiplier" coming quickly. (Note: This comes down with the Gambler's Fallacy; every round is an independent event).
