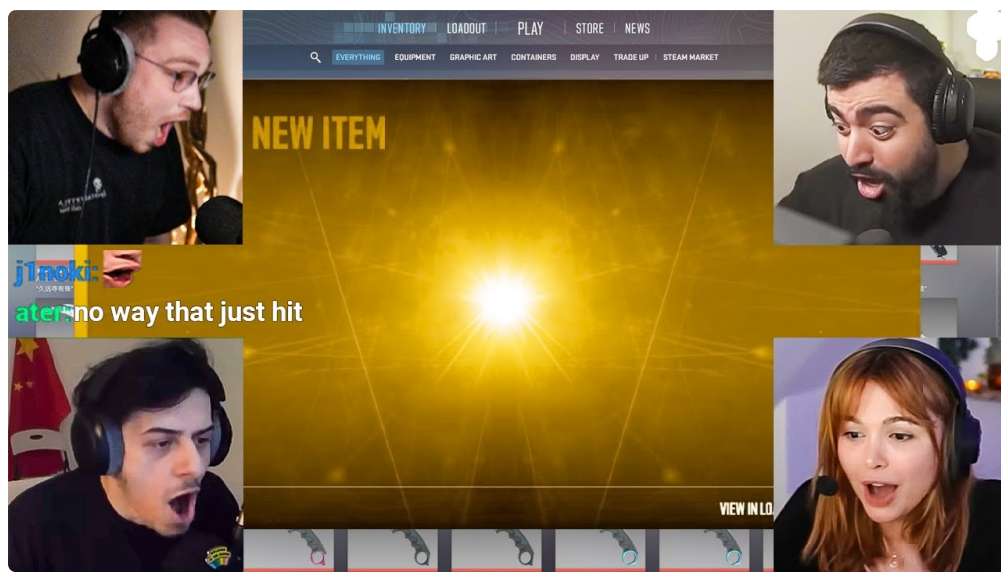


The Ultimate Guide to Case Battle CS2: Rules, Strategies, and Everything You Need to Know
