

As we track the hurricane season each year, a reliable question comes up: which pieces of patio furniture should you secure, tie down, or store inside? The answer isn't as straightforward as "everything." Complacency during a quiet season or overreliance on NOAA's seasonal outlooks can lead many to overlook critical timing and safety steps. In this post, I'll break down what patio furniture truly poses a threat during a hurricane, the importance of proactive timing, and practical tie-down options to protect your home and neighborhood.

Quiet Season Complacency: Why Waiting Is Risky

Years with fewer storms tend to lull homeowners into a false sense of security. It's common to hear, "It's a slow season, I'll worry about patio furniture later." The problem: by the time a tropical storm or hurricane watch is issued, it's often too late. Understanding the Limits of NOAA Seasonal Outlooks

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) provides seasonal hurricane outlooks that often get conflated with exact predictions. These outlooks give a probability range for named storms but cannot pinpoint whether your area will be directly impacted.

Peak Season Timing: When to Start Securing Patio Furniture

The Atlantic hurricane season officially runs from June 1 through November 30, but activity tends to pick up significantly from mid-August through October. During this window, yard inspections and securing efforts should increase.

1. **June–July:** Begin detailed yard walk-throughs. Ask yourself, "*What can become a projectile during strong gusts?*" Lightweight chairs, cushions, umbrellas, decorative pots, and even small grills qualify.
2. **August–September:** Take action with storing inside or tie-downs. Front-load securing outdoor furniture—don't wait until a watch or warning triggers local curbside debris collection suspensions.
3. **October–November:** Maintain readiness through the active weeks. Continually reassess as tropical systems form.

Remember: It's easier to avoid projectiles than to repair damage or wait weeks for debris pickup.

- **Lightweight Chairs and Tables:** Those made from plastic, aluminum, or thin metal are easy for wind gusts to lift.

- **Loose Cushions and Pillows:** Remove and store inside early—no tie-downs substitute storing for these.
- **Grills and Fire Pits:** Often overlooked — clean and cover them or move to a sheltered area.
- **Decorative Items, Pots, and Planters:** These can become heavy flying debris or cause property damage if broken.

Tie-Down Options

Method Best For Notes
Outdoor-rated Bungee Cords Light chairs and tables Easy to apply but may break during strong winds; use multiple for larger items
Heavy-Duty Ratchet Straps Large umbrellas, grills, heavier furniture Secure to fixed structures like porch railings or heavy concrete blocks
Furniture Covers with Tie-Down Flaps Furniture Covers
Longer-term storage options Must be used with additional tie-down methods to prevent wind catching
Moving Furniture Indoors Cushions, pillows, small tables, lightweight pieces Most reliable option. Remove as soon as tropical activity looks likely

Early Storage: The Best Defense

When possible, store unsecured patio furniture inside a garage, shed, or even indoors. Early storage is key for minimizing loss and risk. Many residents wait until storm watches are issued—but by then, municipal services often suspend curbside collection, leaving you to manage debris removal on your own.

Additionally, once a hurricane watch is declared, many roads become congested, and local crews prioritize emergency response and debris removal of major hazards. Having your patio furniture stored safely long before watch triggers improves both safety and cleanup logistics.

Avoiding The “I’ll Wait for a Watch” Trap

It's a natural reaction to say, “Why bother now?” when the season seems quiet or NOAA outlooks look mild. But unsecured patio furniture is a hazard during any tropical storm or hurricane. 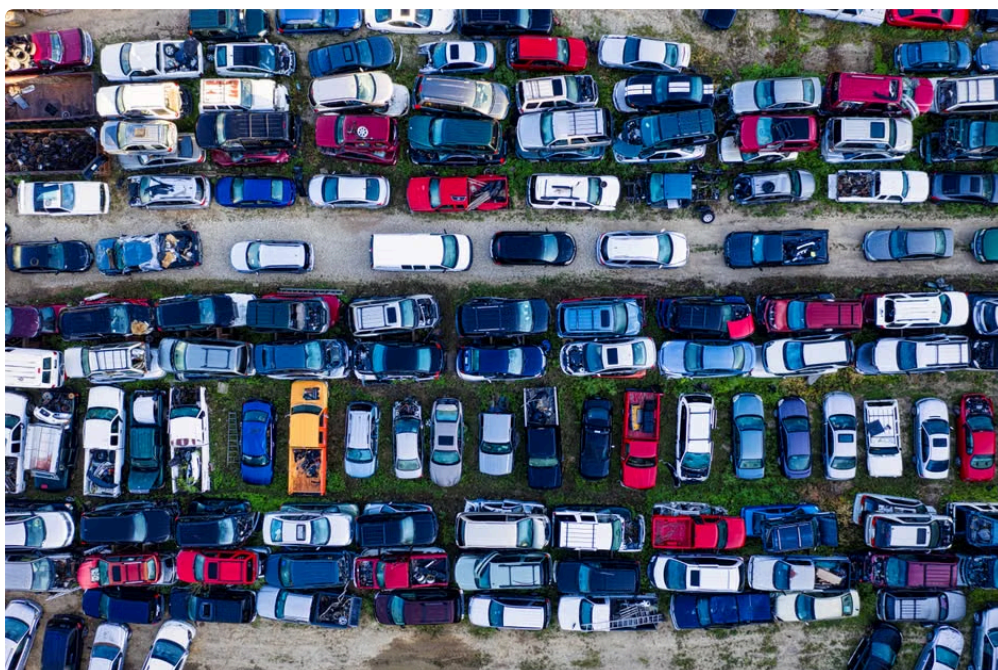
Checklist: Securing Patio Furniture Before Hurricane Season Peaks
