5. **Key Gets Stuck:** Once the car is turned off, the key can not be eliminated from the ignition cylinder.
6. **Hot Key or Cylinder:** The metal key or the ignition area feels unusually hot to the touch after driving, suggesting an electrical short.

What You *Should* Do:

1. **Put the automobile in Park (or Neutral for manuals)** and engage the emergency situation brake.
2. **Call a mobile vehicle locksmith** right away.
3. **Keep the damaged pieces** of the key. The locksmith can utilize these fragments to cut a brand-new key on the area utilizing specialized machinery.
