Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Small scratches or acnes, generally just visible upon close examination.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear, scratches, and fading. This is the most typical condition in the market.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.45	Considerable wear; paint is noticeably broken and dull in significant areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.45-- 1.00	Heavy wear. The weapon looks greatly weathered, rusted, or damaged. (Note: Some skins look distinctively "cool" or "blackened-out" in high float BS).

It deserves keeping in mind that some skins are hardcoded to never ever appear in certain conditions. For example, a particular skin might only exist in Factory New and Minimal Wear conditions.

Rarity Tiers: From Consumer to Covert

Skins are classified into various rarity tiers, which dictate how difficult they are to obtain through random case drops or trade-ups.

- **Consumer Grade (White):** Common, fundamental weapon finishes.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less typical than customer grade.
- **Mil-Spec Grade (Dark Blue):** The standard tier for many weapon case drops.
- **Limited (Purple):** Noticeably rarer and often features more detailed art work.
- **Classified (Pink):** Highly in-demand skins with complex designs.
- **Covert (Red):** The highest basic weapon tier, including iconic styles like the *AK-47|Redline* or *M4A4|Growl* (Contraband).
- **Special Rare (Gold):** Knives and Gloves. These are the rarest and most expensive basic drops in the game.
