Keep your suit in a quality garment bag as a carry-on item, giving it top priority throughout your journey. This brings us to the next critical piece: choosing the right garment bag.

Pack Accessories Separately

- **Different shape and bulk:** These can cause uneven pressure points that wrinkle your surface.
- **Easy access:** You might need to retrieve or adjust them during travel.
- **Risk of damage or loss:** Separating them ensures they don't get crushed or misplaced.

My tip: Use a small, dedicated accessories pouch or box that fits comfortably inside your carry-on luggage. Label it clearly so you never forget essential finishing touches for your wedding look.

Carry-On Tactics and Boarding Strategy

How and when you board plays a crucial role in keeping your suit pristine. Here are my tried-and-true tips:

1. **Check your airline's overhead bin dimensions:** Confirm that your Von Baer garment bag fits as a carry-on. If it's borderline, consider early check-in to secure a spot.
