

Newton does not behave like a single town. That is the first thing to understand about it. On a map, it sits just west of Boston, close enough to feel the city's pull, but its personality changes block by block. One stretch feels formal and residential, another looks like a village center with café traffic and dry cleaners, and another opens into wide green space where the road bends around stone walls and old trees. If you want to understand Newton well, you have to think geographically, historically, and practically at the same time.
