Beyond these basic tiers, weapon finishes likewise include **StatTrak™** innovation (which tracks the variety of kills made with that particular weapon, marked by a digital counter on the weapon) and **Souvenir** versions (dropped during official esports tournaments).

Use Conditions and Float Values

A major consideration of a skin's appearance and value is its **Wear Condition**, often described as the float value. The float value is a decimal number varying from **0.00 to 1.00** that determines how scratched, used, or faded a texture appears.



The 5 main wear conditions are:

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07-- Looks beautiful, though some skins can still have minor scratches even at 0.00.
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15-- Slight indications of wear, usually small scratches on the magazine or edges.
3. **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38-- Noticeable wear and tear, however the general artwork remains undamaged. This is the most typical condition traded.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45-- Significant wear, with large portions of the paint scraped away or faded.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00-- Heavily damaged. Some skins go through huge visual transformations at this stage, sometimes looking totally rusted or weathered.

Keep in mind: Certain skins are "float-capped," suggesting they can not exist in certain conditions. For example, a particular skin may be topped at a minimum float of 0.06, making Factory New the only high-tier condition readily available.

The Economics of CS: GO Skins

The market surrounding these virtual items is regularly studied by economic experts and monetary experts. Because Valve permits peer-to-peer trading and third-party cash-out sites, skins function likewise to stocks or uncommon art. A number of key motorists determine skin prices:

- **Supply and Demand:** If a case is stopped and stops dropping, the supply of its skins freezes while demand may continue to increase, increasing prices.
- **Pro Player Influence:** When a famous esports expert uses a particular skin throughout a major tournament, its appeal and cost often rise overnight.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in 10 skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next greater tier from the very same collection, impacting the blood circulation of high-end items.
- **Sticker labels and Patches:** Applying unusual tournament sticker labels (such as Kato '14 holos) to a weapon can considerably increase its general worth, depending on the buyer.
