5. **Seek warranty terms in writing:** Never proceed without explicit contractor warranty commitments, especially on bespoke kitchen appliance combinations.
6. **Know the rules:** Confirm that all electrical appliance installations meet *Building Regulations Part P* standards—particularly for new wiring, sockets, or notifiable work.
