How to Acquire Rust Skins

- 1. The Steam Item Store:** Every Thursday, Facepunch launches a new batch of community-created skins selected by the developers. Buying them straight from the store ensures the base price (usually in between £ 0.99 and £ 2.99).
- 2. The Steam Community Market:** Once skins have been acquired or dropped, gamers can buy and offer them easily on the Steam Market. Costs are dictated by supply and demand, meaning rare or popular skins can increase in worth.
- 3. Random In-Game Drops:** Simply using official or community servers grants random item drops over time, though these are generally lower-tier typical or unusual items.

4. **Jerk Drops:** Facepunch frequently partners with popular content creators to use exclusive, time-limited skins for viewers who view participating streams.
