3. **Field-Tested (FT):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Noticeable wear and scratches, balancing affordability and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Significant paint chipping and heavy wear patterns.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Greatly deteriorated, sometimes looking rusted, weathered, or nearly entirely removed of paint.

Keep in mind: Certain skins-- such as the famous AWP|Asiimov-- do not generate in Factory New condition, making their lowest possible wear states extremely rare and important.

How the Economy Works

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a popular esports expert starts utilizing a specific skin throughout a significant tournament, the demand for that product generally spikes over night.
