Running the disposal with cold water before the holiday rush confirms it is working properly, and any grinding or straining noise is worth addressing now rather than mid dinner prep.

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Guest bathrooms that see light use most of the year suddenly get a workout during a holiday gathering, and a slow drain or running toilet that has been tolerated for months becomes a genuine inconvenience with a house full of people. A quick check of every bathroom in the house before guests arrive catches these issues while there is still time to schedule a repair. Water heater capacity is worth thinking through honestly if the household is expecting overnight guests. A tank sized comfortably for a family of four can run out quickly with extra people showering back to back, and Murrieta Valley Plumbing can advise on whether a temporary adjustment or a longer term upgrade makes sense for a household that regularly hosts larger gatherings.
