Condition Name	Drift Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Pristine condition with little to no noticeable scratches or use. Usually commands the highest price.
Very Little Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Small blemishes, slight scratches, or small paint breaking, typically just visible upon close evaluation.
Field-Tested (FT)	0.15-- 0.38	Obvious wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Considerable wear, heavy scratches, and notable paint loss around the edges and high-friction areas.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Incredibly worn, heavily faded, and often dramatically changed look. Some collectors specifically look for out severe BS drifts for a "blackimov" impact.

Beyond basic wear, some skins likewise feature a **StatTrak™** technology module, which tracks the variety of kills a gamer gets with that specific weapon, adding a glowing orange digital counter to the body of the gun.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic items in lots of other modern-day video games, CS2 skins have real-world financial worth since they are completely tradeable and valuable. Players can buy, sell, and trade products by means of the Steam Community Market or through reputable third-party marketplaces utilizing real currency or cryptocurrencies.

Numerous factors dictate the rate of a CS2 skin:
