- **Check Platform Reputation:** Research independent review boards, Reddit communities, and trust pilot ratings before depositing funds or skins onto any brand-new platform.
- **Provably Fair Systems:** Look for websites that utilize "Provably Fair" algorithms, which permit users to mathematically verify that the result of each battle was totally random and unmanipulated.
