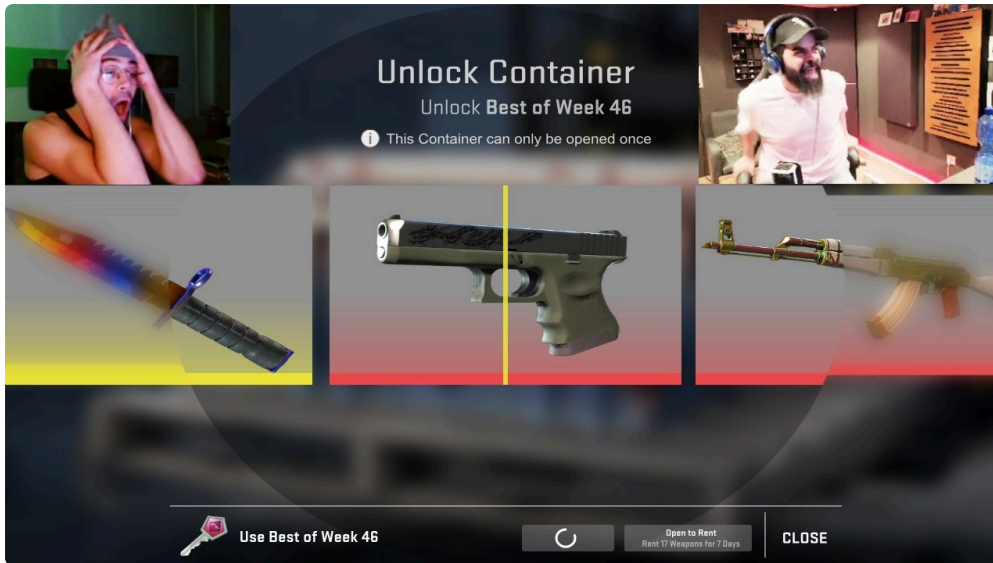


10 Healthy CSGO Cases Habits

: GO Cases: A Deep Dive into the Game's Most Coveted Loot Boxes

An informative guide for gamers, collectors, and market watchers

Given that the launch of Counter-Strike: Global Offensive (CS: GO) in 2012, in-game loot boxes-- known as "cases"-- have become one of the most talked-about features in the esports world. Note: Exact chances can differ from case to case; some more recent cases adjust probabilities somewhat to show market demand.

* ROI (Return on Investment) is calculated as the typical resale worth of the rarest skin divided by the total cost of the case plus key, expressed as a portion.

Elements Influencing Case Value

- **Rarity of the consisted of skins:** Cases that include recently presented "Covert" or "Rare" skins often see a spike in need.
