

Hollyville does not announce itself with the kind of drama that some Delaware towns manage easily. It does not have a boardwalk skyline, a historic downtown packed shoulder to shoulder with boutiques, or a postcard-famous waterfront that draws the eye from miles away. What it does have is something I have always found more interesting: a sense of place that reveals itself slowly. Hollyville sits in that part of Sussex County where the land opens up, the roads get quieter, and local life begins to feel governed more by routine, agriculture, and nearby community hubs than by tourism. For visitors, that can be refreshing. For residents and business owners, it creates a practical, grounded rhythm that tells you a lot about how southern Delaware works.
