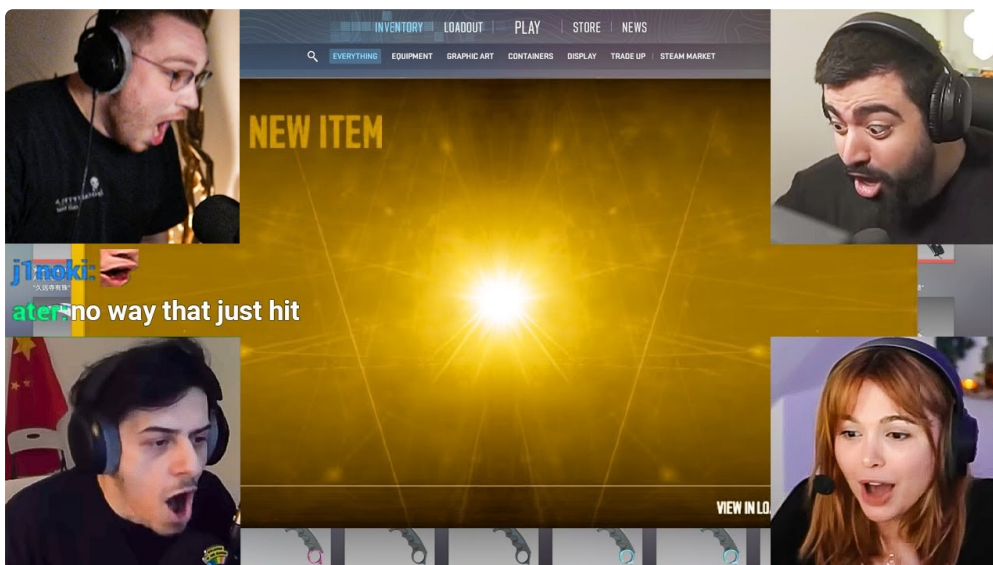
1. Bankroll Management
