3. Roulette

Comparable to conventional gambling establishment roulette, however normally adjusted with three results (red, black, and green/multiplier) represented by CS2 skin colors or team logo designs.

4. Coinflip

A simple 1v1 game where 2 players wager skins or credits of approximately equal value. The system flips a virtual coin, and the winner takes the whole pot (minus a little website commission, called the "rake").

5. Jackpot

Numerous gamers deposit skins into a main pool. A virtual timer counts down, and a winner is chosen via a lottery system. The higher the value of the skins a gamer deposits, the higher their analytical opportunity of winning the entire pot.

Security, Risks, and Security Measures

Because CS2 gambling sites run outside of Valve's direct control, users must work out severe caution. Engaging with these platforms carries several notable risks:

- **Scams and Phishing:** Fake sites frequently mimic popular gambling platforms to take Steam login credentials or high-tier inventory items.
- **Lack of Consumer Protection:** Since many sites operate in legal grey areas, users who experience technical glitches, locked funds, or unjust bans have little option through standard legal channels.
- **Risk of Addiction:** The hectic nature of skin gambling, integrated with the psychological attraction of unboxing unusual items, can result in issue gambling.

Best Practices for Safe Participation
