- **Account Bans:** Valve consistently prohibits trade bots and individual accounts associated with business gambling operations.

In spite of these efforts, the market adapts. Sites have shifted toward accepting cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT) or alternative payment processors together with-- or entirely in location of-- direct skin trading, allowing them to circumvent Steam's limitations.
