3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.37 (Noticeable wear and tear)
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.37-- 0.44 (Significant wear on paint and edges)
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00 (Heavily damaged, sometimes altering the skin entirely)

- **Active Drop Pool:** Cases currently dropping to players actively playing the video game.
- **Uncommon (Discontinued) Drop Pool:** Older cases that no longer drop regularly to active gamers. They drop at an exceptionally low rate (estimated under 1% possibility per drop) to a tiny portion of players weekly.
