

Hollywood, Florida has a way of surprising people. Some arrive expecting a straight shot between Miami and Fort Lauderdale, a beach town with a few hotels and not much else. Then they spend a day or two here and realize how much depth sits behind the palm trees and boardwalks. Hollywood has old Florida grit, a genuinely livable downtown, a long Atlantic shoreline, and neighborhood spots that still feel local in a county that changes fast.
