1. Camouflage Sets

In a video game heavily focused on stealth, positioning, and forest prowling, skin option matters.

- **Woodland/Forest Camo:** Sets like the *Sylvan* or *Forest Raiders* series assistance players blend into timberline and bushes.
- **Snow Camo:** Essential for tundra biomes. Wearing bright red in the snow makes a player a strolling bullseye, whereas white-themed skins provide important concealment.

2. Night Advantages
