

Hollyville, Delaware does not announce itself the way a beach town does. It does not need to. Places like this earn their meaning through the slower facts of daily life: a road that locals know by habit, a familiar church steeple, the stretch of farmland that still opens up between neighborhoods, and the practical businesses that keep homes, farms, and small operations running.
