3. **BSOD (Blue Screen of Death):** The whole computer crashes, typically pointing towards a severe driver or hardware instability problem.

Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing recurring crashes, overcome the following troubleshooting steps methodically.

1. Confirm the Integrity of Game Files

With time, game files can end up being corrupted due to unforeseen system shutdowns, insufficient updates, or defective storage drives. Steam has a built-in tool to inspect and change missing or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and choose **Properties**.
- Browse to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Await the process to surface (Steam will automatically download any damaged files), then reboot your computer system.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

Your graphics card chauffeur is the bridge in between your hardware and CS: GO. Outdated or damaged drivers are a main source of video game instability.

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or go to the official NVIDIA website to download the most recent Game Ready Driver.
- **AMD Users:** Use the AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition to examine for updates.
- *Pro Tip:* If the crashes started instantly after a motorist upgrade, utilize a tool like **Display Driver Uninstaller (DDU)** in Safe Mode to totally clean the old motorist before installing a steady, older variation.

3. Change Launch Options

Certain launch alternatives can require CS: GO to run in a more stable environment, bypassing introduction videos or forcing particular DirectX modes.

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and select **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, look for **Launch Options**.
- Get in the following advised stable commands (separated by spaces):

 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU top priority)
 - -autoconfig (Resets video and performance settings to default if the game declines to launch)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

Permissions issues can often avoid CS: GO from accessing necessary system files or saving setup modifications.

- Navigate to your CS: GO installation folder (normally C: \ Program Files (x86) \ Steam \ steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).

- Locate the primary executable file (csgo.exe).
- Right-click the file and choose **Properties**.
- Go to the **Compatibility** tab and check **Run this program as an administrator**.
- Click Apply and OK.

5. Check for Background Application Interference

Overlay software and hardware monitoring tools frequently hook into the DirectX pipeline of games, which can trigger abrupt crashes. Try disabling the following applications while playing:

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party antivirus software (try including an exclusion for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If fundamental repairs stop working to solve the problem, the issue might lie deeper within your os or hardware setup.

1. Managing Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM supplies a performance boost, CS: GO is notoriously delicate to hardware instability.

- If you have applied an aggressive overclock, attempt dialing it back to baseline factory requirements.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is causing the crashes.

2. Reinstalling CS: GO Cleanly

Sometimes, leftover custom maps, outdated workshop products, or heavily customized configuration files trigger relentless disputes.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- By hand navigate to the setup directory site (... steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and erase any staying folders.
- Reinstall a fresh copy of the game.

Preventative Maintenance Checklist

- **Keep Windows Updated:** Install the newest cumulative updates for your os.

- **Clear DirectX Shader Cache:** Periodically clear your GPU's shader cache through the NVIDIA/AMD control board to prevent rendering errors.
