- Licenses from countries that signed the **1968 Vienna Convention on Road Traffic** can normally be exchanged directly, though tests might be required depending upon bilateral arrangements and residency duration.
- Licenses from countries under the **1949 Geneva Convention** normally need passing the theoretical state examination.
