This single upgrade caused a huge shockwave in the trading neighborhood, completely separating "investable skins" from "functional keys."

Kinds of Keys in Counter-Strike

Not all secrets are developed equivalent. Throughout the years, Valve introduced a number of variations of keys tied to particular collections or occasions.

1. Standard Case Keys

Bought directly from the in-game shop for £ 2.50. These can open the huge majority of standard weapon cases currently dropping in the game.

2. Operation Keys
