The Fix: Replace worn-out weatherstripping and [Door Repair](#) door sweeps. If the door itself does not close tightly versus the stop, adjusting the strike plate can pull the door snugger versus the frame.

3. Squeaking and Sticking Hinges

A high-pitched squeak is often the outcome of friction and a lack of lubrication.

The Fix: Avoid using cooking oil, which brings in dust and gums up the mechanism. Instead, apply a silicone-based spray or a few drops of 3-in-1 oil to the hinge pins.
