This single upgrade triggered a massive shockwave in the trading community, permanently separating "investable skins" from "functional secrets."

Types of Keys in Counter-Strike

Not all keys are produced equal. [Go to the website](#) For many years, Valve presented a number of variations of secrets tied to particular collections or occasions.

1. Standard Case Keys

Acquired straight from the in-game store for £ 2.50. These can open the huge bulk of standard weapon cases currently dropping in the video game.

2. Operation Keys

During particular operations (like Operation Hydra, Breakout, or Wildfire), Valve launched operation-specific cases along with dedicated operation keys. As soon as the operation ended, these secrets typically retained their functionality for their particular cases, ending up being collector's items.

3. Esport Keys

Introduced early in CS: GO's life-span to help fund prize swimming pools for professional competitions, Esport secrets opened Esport-specific green, blue, and red cases. These are extremely uncommon today.
