

Knoxville has a way of surprising people who only know it by name. It is close enough to the Great Smoky Mountains to feel tied to outdoor adventure, yet it has its own city rhythm, shaped by riverfront walks, old brick neighborhoods, university energy, and a calendar that fills up with festivals before the weather turns hot. You can spend a morning in a historic district, an afternoon by the Tennessee River, and an evening in a crowd downtown without ever feeling like you've left the same city. That variety is part of Knoxville's appeal, but it also explains why the built environment here needs attention.
