- **Trade Hold Implementations:** To decrease the fast transfer of skins between accounts, Valve presented a seven-day trade hang on products traded from user stocks. This severely disrupted the instant-deposit and instant-withdrawal models that gambling sites relied upon.
- **Cease-and-Desist Letters:** Valve has lawfully pressured popular platform operators to shut down their operations or pivot away from using Steam-related facilities.

Despite these steps, operators continue to adjust by using peer-to-peer markets, alternative cryptocurrencies, and overseas licensing to keep their platforms running.

Best Practices for Navigating the Ecosystem
