- **Rare Drop Pool Cases:** Older cases that no longer drop often after matches. Instead, they drop at an extremely low rate (approximated under 1% of the time) to an extremely little number of players.
- **Celebratory/ Major Cases:** Souvenir packages dropped to viewers enjoying official CS: GO/CS2 Major competitions. These do not need keys to open.

Popular Historical Cases

- **The Operation Bravo Case (2013):** One of the earliest and most in-demand cases, featuring renowned skins like the Fire Serpent AK-47.
- **CS: GO Weapon Case (2013):** The very first case introduced to the video game, popular for containing the initial Weapon Case knives.
- **Prisma and Danger Zone Cases:** Modern classics that introduced popular finishes and community-designed favorites.

The Virtual Economy: Supply and Demand

The economy surrounding CS: GO weapon cases acts just like a real-world stock exchange. Due to the fact that cases in the active drop pool ultimately move to the rare drop swimming pool, their supply becomes limited.
