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A healthy septic tank is a peaceful partner. When it works, you barely consider it. When it fails, you consider little else. A backup on a holiday weekend, a soggy patch over the drain field, a whiff of sulfur near the tank cover, these problems carry genuine costs and a fair amount of stress.
