

Termites remain one of the most annoying pests a homeowner can encounter because the damage often happens where you cannot see it. Hollow-sounding wood is also worth checking. If you tap on trim, baseboards, or beams and the wood sounds empty, termites may have eaten away the inside while leaving a thin surface layer intact. That is one reason termite infestations can go unnoticed until the damage becomes more advanced.

Frass is an additional term homeowners should know. While frass is often associated with drywood termites or other wood-destroying insects, it can still point to hidden activity in and around the home. Any unusual debris near damaged wood should be inspected carefully, especially if it appears alongside other warning signs.

- Check for mud tubes on foundation walls and basement edges.

- Look for discarded wings near windows and lights during swarm season.
- Knock on wood to see whether it sounds hollow-sounding wood.
- Look for small piles of frass or debris near damaged areas.

Indoor wear within the home

When termites move deeper into a structure, the early clues become easier to see indoors. Sagging floors can be one of the more alarming indicators, especially if the damage seems to appear without a clear cause. Termite feeding can weaken hidden supports and allow floor surfaces to move or sag.

Spongy or bubbled drywall is another common sign. You may notice areas that feel mushy, bubble outward, or look stained for no obvious reason. In some homes, termite tunnels or moisture intrusion can create visible changes in interior walls long before a homeowner realizes the source.

Hard-to-open doors and windows can also be a clue. If frames begin to warp or shift because of hidden wood damage, openings that once worked normally may become difficult to move. Damaged baseboards are especially important to inspect, since termites often attack lower wood elements first. If baseboards feel soft, break down when touched, or look uneven, the issue should not be ignored.

These signs are not always caused by termites alone. Moisture issues, settling, and seasonal expansion can also affect interior walls and trim. Still, when several symptoms appear together, especially in older homes, it is time to arrange a professional evaluation.

Symptoms of termite infestation around the base and outside

The outside of the house often gives the best clues about termite infestation. Check first with the foundation cracks, because termites can take advantage of very small openings to reach hidden spaces. Even narrow gaps may be enough for subterranean termites to enter if conditions are favourable.

Examine crawl spaces if your home has them. These areas are often poorly lit, humid, and difficult to access, which makes them ideal for hidden activity. Mulch beds around the home should also be checked. Wood rot is another frequent lookalike. Rot is usually caused by persistent moisture and fungal decay, not insects. Still, the resulting damage can mimic termite feeding, and both problems may happen at the same time if moisture control is poor.

Moisture damage often shows up in basements, around windows, or along exterior walls. It may cause stains, swelling, peeling paint, or softened wood. Because termites are attracted to damp areas, moisture damage can also signal a broader pest risk.

Sawdust near wood is not always a termite clue either. Carpenter ants, renovation work, or deterioration from wood rot can all create similar debris. That is why a careful inspection matters: what looks like sawdust may actually be frass, or it may point to a different issue entirely. A trained eye can separate pest activity from structural wear and tear.

Why North York properties may be at risk
